from 1878 until he was called to be with the Lord in 1908. He was Trustee of the church for many years and also served as clerk until 1899.

HISTORY

Our church records convey the fact that the Congregational people were holding meetings in the schoolhouse with Rev. B. G. Page of Dorchester as pastor for sometime prior

to the organization of the church.



On May 15, 1875, Mr. and Mrs. Anson Paine, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Harrison, and Mr. and Mrs. Herman F. Moeller met in the schoolhouse at Priendville to consider the advisability of forming a church, as there was none here at that time. A committee was appointed to co-operate with the pastor Rev. B. G. Page to council with neighboring churches.

On June 15 of the same year the committee called a meeting at the Frantz Hall. By a unanimous vote it was declared expedient to organize a church and it should be a Congregational Church, with the following charter members:

tional Church at Dorchester; and Henry Harrison, on profession of faith in Christ.

In the afternoon the congregation met in the school house with the representatives of nine churches in council. The proceedings in regard to the formation of a Congregational Church, together with creed, covenant, and constitution, were submitted to the council, read and approved.

A service of recognition was arranged to take place immediately. Rev. Simon Barrows, of Osceola, who was present, was invited to preach the sermon, Rev. Gates to read the covenant and prayer, Rev. Bates, the charge to the church, and the right hand of fellowship to be extended by the Rev. Bross. The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Page whose labors had been blessed in the organization of this church.

They continued to hold meetings in the school house until the fall of 1877. Then in October the building of the church was let by contract; the carpenter work with exception of window frames to be done for two hundred and ninety-five dollars.

During this winter the meetings were held in the Frantz & Brickley Hall. In the spring the church was plastered and painted.

It might be interesting to note that when the location of the church was decided upon, there was much opposition, as most everyone was certain that the town would not grow beyond the draw but would grow to the north and west. But the Lord, as in many times since in the history of this church, knowing the future, guided the minds of those who made the final decision, and the years since have proved it to be an ideal location.

If one could picture the town as it was then, only a few streets, a few scattered dwellings most of which were north of where the church now stands, a large draw to the south and east of it, one could more fully realize the wisdom of depending on the Lord for guidance.

Rev. Page lived in a dugout on the slope of ground where the Warren Memorial Hospital now stands. One dark night while he was going to the store of E. Slagg and the house of Mrs. E. J. Hurlburt to arrange for some church singing, he fell into an open cellar way. He was injured so badly that he was an invalid until his death the following November. He was buried in the Whitcomb Cemetery in the North part of town. During his three years as pastor, the church membership increased from 7 to 29. He is remembered as one of the beloved pastors and left in the hearts of those who knew him a benediction of kindness.

In July the church because of Rev. Page's continued illness, accepted his resignation, and called Rev. Pred Alley of Wilber, who was scribe at the organization of the church, to be paster for three months.

In November B. J. Chase was called to preach until July 1879. During this time with many prayers and much sacrifice the little first church was paid for, not a finished product that we see in the

picture for not even the belt and tower were on it as we will see later. As they felt they could, they made additions.

Rev. Winslow came in October 1879. In 1880, after buying a new organ in September, and a stove in November, they made arrangements to dedicate the church in December. The Methodist closed their morning service and came to the dedicatory service, the Methodist pastor assisting in the services. In the fall of 1881 a new bell was purchased and a tower built for it.

In April 1883, Rev. Winslow resigned and in July Rev. Orville Clark was called at a salary of \$1,000.

In August of the same year, when an addition was built to the church to be used 'for prayer room and pastor's study,' we read the following in the church records: "Robert Sands, Sr., and H. F. Moeller, trustees of the church, this day negotiated a loan with Mr. L. E. Southwick for \$225.00 with 10 percent interest in advance for one year, giving their personal note for \$250.00, to pay for the building attached to the church."


We also note that the church which began with seven members had now grown to fifty members.

In May 1885, Pastor O. C. Clark resigned because of ill health and Mr. Thome, a student from Oberlin supplied the pulpit for two months. In August, the church called Rev. Sydney Strong, who commenced his pastorate in September at a salary of \$800.

In the clerk's report for 1886, he said this was their most prosperous year in the history of the church. Thirty-seven new members had been added, and the church had been enabled to assume self support through the use of the envelope system.

In May 1887, Rev. Strong resigned, and Wm. E. Davidson of Central Park. Chicago, began his pastorate in October. During his pastorate he was ordained in the Congregational church of Priend. Rev. Sharrett from England was the next pastor but he stayed only a few months.

Rev. Dada came in July 1889 as pastor at \$500 with parsonage. He was pastor for five years, the longest pastorate in the history of this church. In the last November of his pastorate, the Methodist and Baptist joined the Congregational church in revival meetings. Mr. Billings was the evangelist and Mr. Byers as singer. As a result of these meetings, this church received twenty-one new members.

The pastor preached his farewell sermon in July 1894, and the clerk at the end of this year said in his report that it had been a year of trials and discouragement. They were without a pastor the last half of the year, and the failure of crops crippled them financially, but thanks to the Ladies Home Circle they were almost out of debt.

The church, in February of 1895, having a pastor in view, asked aid of Home Mission Society, but they were unable to help them.

Finally, in September, after having had church whenever they could get supplies, they called Rev. Amos Dean of Crete to preach every Sunday morning, with a salary of \$250.00 a year. For a year and a half he served the church, still making his home at Crete although they had hoped he would move to Friend. Whenever he was unable to come, he would send President Perry of Doane College or some of the college students who were pregaring for the ministry. Deacon Moeller, living on the road from Crete to Friend, was generally the one to entertain them, since they usually came by horse and buggy.

At the beginning of 1897, the church decided to do without a pastor until their finances were better. For the next six months, Dr. Hewit, H. M. Smith, and H. F. Moeller took turns in conducting the services and reading sermons.

In October of this year, they were happy to have Rev. Wm. B. Payne, with his able wife and three children take up their abode in the parsonage, where for three years he and his wife ministered very efficiently to a grateful people. Mrs. Payne was a wonderful worker among young people. It wasn't long until she had a large Sunday School class of young men and women. Also she organized a Junior Christian Endeavor Society, which met every Saturday attendor at the church, so that the children from the country could attend. While they were here a living-room and bedroom were added to the parsonage and the church was repaired.

The many years of sacrifice and struggle seemed from now on to be at an end, and we see only progress—material prosperity, gain in membership, and spirituality. However, behind the latter I would put a question mark, for I believe we would have a long way to go to attain the faith, coursee and earnestness that was in our pioneer fathers, who made this country and these churches what they are. Indeed, we have had a rich heritage. Are we living true to it?

Rev. W. W. Hart came as pastor in October 1900, and soon after they began to talk about building a new church, because the old church needed so much repair, and was inadequate for their needs. In August 1901 it was decided to build a new church edifice. A building committee was appointed and given full power to sell or use the old building as they deemed best. On Sunday, September 21, 1902, the new church building was dedicated. Rev. Sydney Strong, pastor of a large church in Oak Park, Illinois, a former pastor, preached the dedicatory sermon. In this service additional pledges, amounting to \$600.00, were raised, which made it possible to dedicate the building free from debt.

The following February Rev. Houser conducted Evangelistic meetings in the new church building, in conjunction with the Baptist, Methodist, and German Congregational churches. In March, Rev. Hart resigned and Rev. Perry A. Sharpe became our pastor in June, faithfully serving the church for three years. During this time, a pipe organ was installed due to the encouragement and liberal gift toward it of Mr. Wm. Southwick, a staunch friend of the church for many years.

In 1906, a new parsonage was built and was ready for use, when Rev. J. S. Hamilton came the following October. Rev. Hamilton was with us for nearly four years but on account of ill-health thought it best to go to another field. He is the only one of our pastors who have been here since 1897 to be called to his reward. It was a great shock to the many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton to hear of their untimely demise, due to an automobile actident in June 1930. One in paying tribute to Mr. Hamilton, after his death, said that he was very lenient to the faults of others, but most strict as to his own conduct.

Mrs. Hamilton organized the Woman's Missionary Society of which she was president until they moved away. Mr. Hamilton's ministry here was one of spiritual growth, for the church we well filled at Sunday services and the prayer meetings were well attended, as it was also during the pastorate of his successor Rev. Edvin F. Wright, who began his labors here in August 1910, leaving in June 1914.

Mrs. Wright reorganized the Junior Christian Endeavor, which had been discontinued for some time because of lack of leadership. Mr. Wright taught a teachers training class and several completed the work and obtained a teacher's certificate.

Dr. H. H. Price came as our pastor in September 1914, remaining here until December 1917. He resigned to go as chaplain in the army. During his ministry, the church celebrated its Fortieth anniversary.

Rev. Leon Moore served as pastor here from Pebruary 1918 to 1920. After he left, Rev. Geo. R. McKeith served as pastor until August 1923.

During Rev. Ralph Pinkham's ministry (November 1923 to July 1928) this church and the Blue Valley Association celebrated together in our church, their fiftieth anniversary, Rev. J. S. Hamilton was the speaker for our church.


Our present pastor. Rev. Wm. Becker came November 1928. Since his coming many new members have been taken into the church. Two successful Evangelistic campaigns have been carried on, which have greatly revived the spiritual life of the people.

For some time hearly every department of the church has felt the need for more room. The women needed a larger kitchen, more room to serve suppers and for the social life of the church. The Sunday School especially was handicapped for more room.

When the building committee started work it was planned only to install a new heating plant and fix over the furnace room with the necessary changes this would require. As work progressed, the necessity of a more extensive building program became evident, and the church board gave their consent and provided for the necessary committees, who have faithfully carried out their duties until at the present time a church can be presented for rededication in splendid repair and adequate for the needs of the church for several years.
