In 1901 it was decided to build a new church. The old building was moved west and turned to face the north and became what is now known as the chapel. The present sanctuary was then built, also a small basement with kitchen and dining room facilities. The basement was also used for Sunday School.

\$7,000 and was dedicated in 1902 free of debt. The old bell was sold and a larger bell was purchased at an additional cost of \$300.00. About this time the B. & M. Lumber Company gave the church the two lots which it then owned and Dr. F. C. Hinman kindly consented to transfer the lot west of the church to the church, so it became the block.





Dr. and Mrs. Hewit have two children; the eldest, Linus G. Hewit, is employed in the Nebraska state motor fuel division, and his sister, Edna Hewitt, works in the University of Nebraska registrar's office.

In 1910, Dr. Hewit retired from active practice in Friend, and he and his wife came to Lincoln to make their home. Many of his old patients still consulted him. but he discontinued his practice

April 5 of this year, Dr. Hewit celebrated his birthday at home with his family and friends. His birthday cake was the largest he'd had yet; it held 93 candles.

For every candle, and for more, there are memories and achievements for this man, whose role has been the courageous one of the pioneer doctor.

Rev. W. W. Hart came as pastor in October 1900 and soon after, they began to discuss plans for the building of a new church, since the old church needed so much repairing, and was inadequate for their needs. The country was becoming more prosperous by this time and the church took on new life. In August 1901 it was decided to build a new church and a building committee of the country was decided to build a new church and a building committee. mittee was appointed and given power to dispose of the old building or use it in whatever way they saw fit. Consequently, the first building was moved back and turned to face the North and this became what is now known as the chapel. The present sanctuary was then constructed, including a small basement with kitchen and dining room facilities. The primary department of the Sunday school and Junior church were to use the besement also day school and Junior church were to use the basement also.

As a result of great effort, the new church building was completed at a cost of about \$7,000.60 and on Sunday, September 21, 1902, it was dedicated free of debt. Rev. Sydney Strong, a former pastor, preached the dedicatory sermon.

While the church was in progress of construction, the question of a larger bell was discussed. The old bell was sold to a party of Utica and the balance of about \$300.00 yet needed was raised by subscription. The bell was purchased and placed in the belfry ready for use at the dedicatory services.

About the time that the new church building was being talked about, it was thought that it would be a fine thing if the church could own the entire half-block upon which the church and parcould own the entire half-block upon which the church and parsonage were located; so the B and M. Land Co. was consulted and they gladly gave the church the remaining two lots which they owned. The other lot to the west of the church belonged to Dr. F. C. Hinman, and he kindly consented to transfer it to the church, thus making the church the owner of the complete half block upon which the church and parsonage are now located. Dr. E. A. Watson conceived the idea of setting out trees and making it a park for all meetings of a moral character. ing it a park for all meetings of a moral character.

The splendid showing of material prosperity is but incidental to the real object of the church, which, as stated in the constitution, is to bring people to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ and is founded upon the broad principle of loving the Lord with all your mind and heart, and loving your neighbor as yourself. That this our church, in its brave and worthy past, did not fail in this its greatest object, is attested by the fact that from 1875 to 1907 a total of 382 persons united with the church either by confession of faith or by letter of transfer.

In 1905 Mr. W. O. Southwick, a staunch friend of the church for many years, conceived the idea that the church ought to have a pipe organ and by his very liberal contribution and effort the organ was purchased and installed. After dedicating the new church free from debt and with prosperity returning it was decided in 1906 that there should be more commodious quarters for the pastor, so the old parsonage was sold and the present structure built at an approximate cost of \$3500.00 The new parsonage was ready for use when Rev. J. S. Hamilton came in October of 1906. Rev. Hamilton served the church for nearly four years but because of ill health thought it best to go to another field. Rev. Hamilton's ministry here was one of spiritual growth for the church was well filled at Sunday services and the prayer meetings were well attended. Mrs. Hamilton organized the Women's Missionary Society of which she was also president until

Rev. Edwin Wright came on August 1, 1910, and served the church until June 1, 1914. He taught a teacher's training class and several completed the work and obtained teacher's certificates. Mrs. Wright organized the Junior Christian Endeavor, which had been discontinued for some time because of lack of leadership.

Dr. H. H. Price came as pastor in September, 1914, remaining here until December 1917, when he resigned to serve as a Chaplain in the army. On September 15, 1915, during his ministry, the church celebrated its Fortieth Anniversary with appropriate and inspiring services. In the Anniversary booklet, then published, there were listed the names of 174 persons as constituting the active membership of our church at that time.

HISTORY



Our church records convey the fact that the Congregational people were holding meetings in the schoolhouse with Rev. B. G. Page of Dorchester as pastor for sometime prior to the organization of the church.

On May 15, 1875, Mr. and Mrs. Anson Paine, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Harrison, and Mr. and Mrs. Herman F. Moeller met in the schoolhouse at Friendville to consider the advisability of forming a church, as there was none here at that time. A committee was appointed to co-operate with the pastor Rev. B. G. Page to council with neighboring churches.

On June 15 of the same year the committee

neighboring churches.
On June 15 of the same year the committee called a meeting at the Frantz Hall. By a unanimous vote it was declared expedient to organize a church and it should be a Congregational Church, with the following charter members: Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Harrison, Congregational Church at Exeter; Mr. and Mrs. Herman F. Church at Exeter; Mr. and Mrs. Anson Paine, Congregational Church at Dorchester; and Henry Harrison, on profession of faith in Christ.

In the afternoon the congregation met in the school house with the representatives of nine churches in council. The proceedings in regard to the formation of a Congregational Church, together with creed, covenant, and constitution, were submitted to the council, read and approved.

A service of recognition was arranged to take place immediate.



A service of recognition was arranged to take place immediately. Rev. Simon Barrows, of Osceola, who was present, was invited to preach the sermon, Rev. Gates to read the covenant and prayer, Rev. Bates, the charge to the church, and the right hand of fellowship to be extended by the Rev. Bross. The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Page whose labors had been blessed in the organization of this church.

They continued to hold meetings in the school house until the fall of 1877. Then in October the building of the church was let by contract; the carpenter work with exception of window frames to be done for two hundred and ninety-five dollars.

During this winter the meetings were held in the Frantz & Brickley Hall. In the spring the church was plastered and painted.



REV. WILLIAM BECKER PASSES AWAY MONDAY

MORNING .-Rev. William Becker passed away Monday morning suffering with a very serious illness. While he had visited the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., several times in the past few months, it was not until recently that he gave up his pastor's work. After a recent operation at Mayos he was brought to the hospital here where he could greet his friends and be near his family. Even up to the last hours he would rally for a minute and recognize his friends, knowing his son, Albert, when he arrived from Hastings

His going is a great loss to the community.

The Reverend's first pastorate with the Congregational church here was in 1928. After serving the church for seven years he went to Lincoln to assume the superintendency of the City Mission. In 1942 he went to the Ogallala Congregational church.

Two and a half years ago the Friend church asked him to return and he did, immediately taking his old place in the community. In this time the church has increased in strength, and during the past year substantial money gifts have been made for a new organ, chimes and a wor-ship center. He had hoped to live to see these dedicated.

His fellowship with other pastors of the city was truly Christian and made him a community figure beloved by all.

He was a great friend of The Sentinel and averaged two visits a week in the office.

Surviving are his wife, Meta, four sons, Rev. Albert C., Hastings; William E., Lincoln, and Robert and Paul, Friend; two daughters, Mrs. F. L. Stevens, Lincoln, and Mrs. John Warner, Des Moines, Ia.

The funeral service is being held this afternoon in the First Congregational church, with the Rev. Alfred Johnson of Chicago, and Rev. Taylor of Lincoln, of-ficiating. Burial will be in the Lincoln Memorial Park.

OBITUARY William Becker

William Becker, son of William and Marie Becker, was born November 29, 1885, at Lindock, Ontario, Canada, and entered God's presence at Friend, on the 10th of November, 1947.

After fifteen boyhood years spent in the family home at Killaloe, Ont., Canada, he made his confession of faith, was baptized and received into the fellowship of the First Baptist Church of his home community. Three years later he first felt God's call to the ministry, and went to Rochester, N. Y., to further his education for this purpose, but being afflicted with a speech impediment he was discouraged in the further pursuit of his calling by faculty members and friends.

He was united in marriage to Meta Bretschneider on June 13, 1913, at Cleveland, Ohio. first seven years of marriage he worked as an electrician, but by his own statement the call to preach burned within him until the door to full time Christian Service opened in 1921. home was blessed with seven children, all of whom survive their father excepting Charles Vaughn who died in infancy. He is also survived by his father, four sisters and three brothers.

He was ordained to the Christian Ministry on September 25, 1923, by the Council of Baptist churches at Grand Rapids, Mich.

In the twenty-six years that followed he was successively, Assistant Superintendent of the City Rescue Mission, Grand Rapids, Mich.; assistant pastor, Moody Bible Church, Chicago; served Congregational church pastorates in Mattawan, Mich.; Friend, Ogallala and again at Friend. Following his first pastorate in Friend he was for seven years superintendent of the City Mission of Lincoln.

The funeral service was held last Thursday afternoon in the First Congregational church, with the Rev. Alfred Johnson of Chicago, and Rev. Taylor of Lincoln officiating.

Paul Toren, of Lincoln, sang, with Miss Maryalice (Macy, also of Lincoln, at the new Hammond organ, which was installed just a few days before Rev. Becker's illness became so serious.

Burial in Lincoln Memorial Park, Lincoln.

Honorary pallbearers were the Ministers of Blue Valley Association of Congregational churches.





Rev. E. Marvin Williams Killed In Two-Car Accident

Rev. Marvin Williams, 56, pastor of Friend's First Congregational church, was killed in an automobile accident near Crete on Friday, August 11th.

A car driven by Gary May, of Crete, collided with that driven by Rev. Williams on highway 33 just east of Crete. The Rev. Williams, alone in his car, died on the way to the hospital.

Rev. Williams had served as pastor of the First Congregational church here for the past seven years. He and his family came to Friend in November of 1954 from Freeborn, Minn.

He was very active in civic affairs and was always eager to lend a helping hand to his neighbor and community. In addition to his duties as minister here, he accepted a call from the Congregational church at Exeter and served as their pastor since January of this year.

With his two charges, Friend and Exeter, he still managed to find time to work with many community projects. One in which he had particular interest was Boy Scouts. Too, at the time of his death, he was serving as county chairman for the Nebraska Crippled Children's Society, and was active in the Fillmore County Ministerial Association. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Eastern Star.

He is survived by his wife, Winnie, of Friend; a daughter, Mrs. Kay Kraus, also of Friend and a son, Larry of Lincoln. Other survivors include sisters, Alta Gulledge of Broseley, Mo., Lettie Dickey of Broseley, Mary Sparkman of Fisk, Mo., Ada Calvin of Detroit, Mich., and Elva Duffy of Memphis, Tenn.

Funeral services were held at the Congregational church here on Monday, Aug. 14th, with the Rev. Fred Register, state conference minister, officiating. Burial was in the Andrew cemetery with arrangements under the direction of the Moore Funeral Home.

OBITUARY REV. EDGAR MARVIN WILLIAMS

Rev. Marvin Williams, son of Henry and Flora Williams, was born in Butler County near Broseley, Mo., on October 26, 1905 and was killed in an automobile accident near Crete, on August 11, 1961 at the age of 55 years, 9 months and 16 days.

The Reverend Williams was ordained into the Ministery of the Congregational church on September 18, 1928.

He was united in marriage to Winnie Swicegood on May 24, 1936. To this union two children were born, Larry of Lincoln and Linda Kay Kraus of Friend.

He served parishes at Weaubeau, Mo.; Farnhamville, Ia.; Newell, Ta.; Primghar, Ia.; Princeton, Minn.; Freeborn, Minn.; and was currently serving the yoked parish at Friend and Exeter, Nebr. At the time of his death he was a member of the State Ministerial Committee and an active member of the Fillmore County Ministerial Association. For the past several years, he has served as Business manager of the Jr. High youth camp at Covenant Cedars, Hordville, Nebr.

He was active in community affairs—serving as chairman of the Saline County Crippled Childrens Association, member of the Masonic Lodge No. 73 at Friend, and was serving as associate patron of the Rose Standish Chapter No. 265 Order of the Eastern Star at Friend.

Reverend Williams was preceded in death by his father and mother and one brother, Arlie.

He is survived by his wifa, Winnie of Friend; daughter, Linda Kay Kraus of Friend; son, Larry of Lincoln; son-in-law, Marvin Kraus of Friend: and Larry's fiancee, Miss Anita Biester of Lincoln. He is also survived by five sisters, Mrs. Mary Sparkman of Fisk, Mo., Mrs. Ada Calvin of Detroit, Mich. Mrs. Alta Gulledge of Brosely, Mo. Mrs. Lettie Dickey also of Brosely, Mrs. Elvo Duffy of Memphis, Tenn., and a host of other relatives and friends.





REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE TO THE CONGREGATION

The committee is confident that the above described parsonage will be built with a budget that will not exceed the available funds, which total in "cash-in-bank", and pledges to be paid, somewhat over \$17,000.

We feel that the congregation, and friends of the Church who have made gifts to the Building Fund, will feel a deep pride and joy in having had a hand in the erection of a new parsonage for the First Congregational Church of Friend.

Congregational Church Services First Held In 1877



The First Congregational Church as it appears today

Congregational Church of Friend Church, Gape Grove, Illinois. reveal a sincere desire on the part of Christian people of the community, then called Friendville, to gather for worship in the early 1870's.

For some time worship services were held in the school house with the Rev. G. B. Page of Dorchester as pastor.

At a meeting on June 15, 1875, those present voted unanimously to organize a Congregational Church. Charter members were:

The church was dedicated in December 1880, but even then it was not complete. A new bell was purchased and a tower built for it in 1881.

In 1883, an addition was built to the church to be used as a prayer room and pastor's study. Two of the trustees negotiated a loan with Mr. L. E. Southwick for \$225.000 at 10% interest in advance for one year and gave their personal note for \$250.00 to pay for the addition to the church.

By this time the membership had grown to 50. In 1886, 37 new members were added and the church assumed self-sup-

In 1894, crops failed and the church was so crippled financially that for six months in 1895 it was unable to employ a minister, so Mr. H. F. Moeller, Mr. H. M. Smith and Dr. H. W. Hewit took turns conducting services and reading sermons thus holding the church together. For several years because of financial depression and crop failures the church had a real struggle, but the faith and courage of those pioneer Christians carried them through.

In 1901 it was decided build a new church. The old building was moved west and turned to face the north and became what is now known as the chapel. The present sanctuary was then built, also a small basement with kitchen kitchen and dining room facilities. The basement was also used for Sunday School.

The new church cost about \$7,000 and was dedicated in 1902 free of debt. The old bell was sold and a larger bell was purchased at an additional cost of \$300.00. About this time the B. & M. Lumber Company gave the church the two lots which it then owned and Dr. F. C. Hinman kindly consented to transfer the lot west of the church to the church, so it became the owner of the complete half

In 1905, Mr. W. O. Southwick, a faithful friend of the church, made it possible for the church to purchase a pipe organ which was in use for about forty years. As it became more and more difficult to get needed repairs,

Children's Home of Henderson, where there were people who knew how to repair it, and a Hammond electric organ was installed in the church.

In 1906, since a more satisfactory home for the pastor was needed, a parsonage was built at approximate cost of \$3,000. The Rev. J. S. Hamilton, brother of Dr. F. T. Hamilton, was the

By its fortieth anniversary members. The Rev. William Becker came to the church in 1928 and served six and a half years during which time there was a fine increase in membership, a new heating plant was installed, the basement of the church was remodelled and enlarged and the sanctuary and chapel were redecorated cellotex.

In December 1944 the pastor and about 50 members left the church to start the Friend Bible Church. This left a membership of 314.


In 1945 a call was issued to the same Rev. William Becker of the earlier pastorate and he returned to the church forward. This pastorate was short due to illness and his release to be with his Lord in November 1947. During this second pastorate new pulpit furniture and organ chimes were provided through memorials from families of the church.

In 1962 Myron Schiefelbein bought and moved the old parsonage, and a new parsonage was built on the same site at a cost of approximately \$21,000.00. The church plans to pay the small indebtedness on this building before the end of 1966.

The women's organization has always been a strong arm of the church, and the youth have had good training in Christian Endeavor, Pilgrim Fellowship and in the Sunday School.

When Congregational, the Christian and the Evangelical and Reformed Churches united to form the United Church of Christ in 1957, this church be-came a United Church of Christ retaining its former name.

The influence of the Moeller family has been felt through the ninety years. Mrs. William Warner, Mrs. Charles Farquharson and Mrs. F. T. Hamilton were all daughters of this "First Family" and they and their children have followed in Mr. and Mrs. Moeller's footsteps. At the present time, Warner, grandson of the Moellers, and his wife are the only members of the family in the church and they continue the fine work of their ancestors. Since so many of the young people of our commuunity now establish their homes in other areas, the Warner and the Hamthan 50 years, three more than churches elsewhere.

Mrs. Fern Chase Honored Recently By The State Centennial Commission

Mrs. Fern Chase was recently honored by the State Centennial Commission as a member of one of Nebraska's pioneer families. The Commission presented her with the Centennial Medal at special ceremonies held recently at the Lincoln Hotel. She was the only one honored that day by the Commission.

Following is a brief history of her family as presented to the

Commission:

Jacob and Susan Brewer and six children, came to Nebraska in 1865. In May of 1866 they bought 80 acres in Otoe County, lived there four years, then moved to Lancaster County, close to where Lincoln is now.

There they took a homestead and stayed on it eight years, moved to Seward County and got a quarter section of land, by quit claim deed, as the person who had homesteaded it couldn't "prove up". This was their home as long as they lived. Susan died on Feb. 2nd, 1895 and Jacob in August of 1905.

Benjamin Franklin, a son of Jacob and Susan Brewer, went to Perkins County and took a homestead, and his sister Huldah, took a tree claim, joining on his place, and part on hers. grandsons.

Huldah kept house and helped work both places to "prove up" on the land. Benjamin Franklin "Frank", came back to Seward County and married Emmaline Richardson and they went to the homestead.

In 1894 with their one year old daughter (born in the sod house), came back to the family home, in Seward County, and lived

With two daughters and one son they moved to Dorchester, for seven months. Moved to Beaver Crossing for three years and then back to the family home where the son died in 1917, aged 12 years and two months.

In 1911 the eldest daughter, Fern, married Clarence Chase and lived on the farm two years, then moved to York County, with one son aged seven months, and stayed on this farm four years. Now with two sons, moved to an "80" four miles east, just into Seward County. They lived on this farm nine months and moved with three sons to another farm one mile north of Cordova. Here they lived for two years before moving to York County on a farm six miles west of Beaver Crossing for another two years and then to near Milford for three years.

Now with six children, moved back to the old home place for eight years, then with ten children, moved to near Friend. They lived on this farm 22 years when Clarence passed away. Two children were born here.

Fern and family stayed on this rented farm four more years, then bought the present home at 603 Pine St. in Friend. One daughter still lives with her.

Five of her 12 children are married and still live in Nebras-ka, namely: Wayne Chase, wife and two children, Rt. 1, Friend; Mrs. Leon Henke, husband, 305 Walnut St., Friend, two married children; Mrs. Eugene Rule, husband, three sons, Rt. 1, Phillips, Nebr.; Mrs. Arthur Os-borne, husband and eight children, Rt. 1, Phillips; Mrs. Neil Falck, husband, three children, York.

The other six children, married and eight grandchildren, live in other states. Fern has six sons and six daughters (includes two sets of twins); 26 it. They built a sod house, part grandchildren and two great




present parsonage.

In May of 1875 a committee was formed and then on June 15th, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Harrison, Mr. and Mrs. Herman F. Moeller, Mr. and Mrs. Anson Paine and Henry Harrison met in Frantz Hall and organized the Congregational Church.

Rev. Page was pastor of this group and the membership grew during those three years to twenty-nine. While going downtown from his home, a dug-out, where the hospital now stands, the Rev. Page fell into a cellar making him an invalid until his death.

The religious meetings continued in the schoolhouse, and then after much discussion of location, the building was begun in the fall of 1877. The church was plastered and painted the following spring. Seats were donated by a church in Missouri. The bell and tower were added later when the congregation felt they could be afforded.



Friend Minister Still Modest Over 'Good Neighbor' Award

Southeast Nebraska Bureau Friend - The Rev. Robert Peters of Friend is still mystified by the Good Neighbor Citation he and his wife received from the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben in

But then what else would you expect from a good neighbor?

When the Peterses received the award it noted their work with youth in Friend, but the Rev. Mr. Peters figures if it was deserved at all, it should have been for the programs established for the elderly through his church.

He is especially proud of the new manor for the elderly which has been built with public funds

since he came to the small Saline County community.

'Couldn't Wait'

"When I came here all the elderly were located in the annex across from the new manor," he said. "They had the attitude that they couldn't wait to die.

The annex is now used to provide services such as meals and cleaning for the elderly who are otherwise able to live outside the manor, and the Rev. Mr. Peters says "it has made a big difference in their of

After the manor was built and we got going on activities for them, attitudes changed dramatically.

Members of the minister's Friend United Church of Christ congregation are instumental in providing programs like bingo, cards and inter-community activities for the elderly.

The Rev. Mr. Peters arranges activities with communities in the Friend area which "they really seem to enjoy.

As for youth activities, the Rev. Mr. Peters says his wife has been active there through teaching church groups, besides raising their three children.

Camping Encouraged

The Peters are avid campers, and have encouraged church youth to take advantage of camping programs which they feel are an integral part of a church

Although he discounts his importance in Friend Public School's half-day voluntary preschool program for 4-year-olds, he has been active in it since its inception four years ago.

"I serve as a teacher's aide volunteer," he says. "My intention at that time was to make observations for use in church programs.

At first the Rev. Mr. Peters served every day, but says that he has now dropped down to about every other day. Besides the experiences and joy of working with youngster, he says a valuable side effect developed.

"I found that it was an excellent way to reach into the lives of families in the community," he says. "I also got several teachers to become active in our church.

"It wasn't intended that way, but that's how it worked out.

1974 Good Neighbor Award For Rev. And Mrs. Robert Peters

Rev. Robert and Berneice Peters were among the ninety-three in-dividuals selected for the 1974 Good Neighbor Award by the Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben. The Peters nominated by friends, will receive a framed citation and gold lapel pin for the activities and recreation programs they have established for young citizens of Friend.

Miss Ada Littlefield of Dorchester, who at 85 goes out of her, way to help others and assists confined neighbors by making visits, bringing mail each morning, groceries or doing odd jobs, has also been recognized.



I am writing you at the request of the Building Committee and the Canvassers, who asked me to share with you the results of the Canvass that was held a week and one half ago.

102 of the 154 cards were returned

There were 46 immediate cash pledges totalling \$ 14, 300. There were 28 five year pledges totalling \$ 22,210 We already have \$ 3,575.15 in the building fund.

- 18 pledges were under \$100
- 19 pledges were between \$100-300
- 4 pledges were between \$500-600
- 5 pledges were \$1000 and over

The building Committee has accepted the apparent wishes of the Congregation and has dissolved after completing its task.

The majority of the Board of Trustees after attempting to winterize the building has re-affirmed its position that the old building cannot be renovated.

What do we do now? This decision will be made by the congregation at a special meeting January 25th at 7:30 P.M. We hope you will come and help decide our future.

While not an exhaustive list of possibilities, the following would appear to be the possible paths that are open to us.

- 1. A more concerted effort to raise funds to build a new building.
- 2. Begin a study with the United Methodist Church to consider a possible merger.
- Set support braces on the old structure and build a new educational unit to the West and South, or entirely to the South.
- 4. Begin a major effort toward building, by developing a building fund to be completed within five years.

The regular Annual meeting will be held on Januaryllth at 2:00 P.M. With the business that must be carried on in the Annual meeting it was thought that there would not be sufficient time for thoroughly discussing this problem but we may have time for limited discussion. We ask that you think through carefully this problem before the January 25th meeting. Thank You!

Dear Members and Friends,

This letter is being written to inform all members and friends of the Church of the reports made and the decisions reached at the annual meeting regarding the new church building.

The building finance committee reported a total of \$60,000 in pledges and cash paid into the fund on the meeting date. After considerable discussion, a motion was made to continue with the building plans by appointing a building committee. This committee, composed of seven members from the different organizations of the church, is to begin studying the needs and planning the structure. Actual construction of the building is not to begin until 80% of the cost is received in cash and short term pledges. The 41 members present voted unanimously in favor of the motion.

The committee also reported that they had visited a few new churches which cost from \$100,000 to \$115,000. It was the opinion of this committee that a building similar to those visited would be adequate for our needs.


All of the bills have been turned in and have now been paid. The total project cost including the specific memorials was \$181,502.92. All of this has been paid by cash donations except for \$61,500.

The present church building will be dismantled and the art glass memorial windows will be placed in the new building which will be brick, steel and concrete. A tower will house the bell.

Church Organized In 1875; First Building In 1878

Congregational people were holding meetings in the school house with the Rev. B. G. Page as pastor for some time prior to the organization of the church.

On May 15, 1875, three couples met in the school house at Friendville (as Friend was then called) to consider the advisibility of forming a church, as there was none in the community.

On June 15 of the same year, a meeting was held at Frantz Hall and it was declared by a unanimous vote that it was expedient to organize a church and that it should be a Congregational Church. It was organized with the following members: Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Harrison from the Congregational Church of Exeter; Mr. and Mrs. Herman F. Moeller of the Congregational Church, Gape Grove, Illinois; Mr. and Mrs. Anson Paine, Congregational Church, Dorchester; and Henry Harrison on profession of faith in Christ.

In October, 1877, a contract was let for the erection of the first church building which was ready for use in 1878. When the location of the building was decided upon, there was much opposition, as most everyone was certain that the town would not grow beyond the draw (Sucker Creek) but would grow to the north and west.

In August 1883, an addition was built to be used "for prayer room and the pastor's study."

The membership continued to grow. For some months in 1894 and 1895 the church was without a pastor.

In 1900, the Rev. H. H. Hart came and soon they began to talk about a new building, because the old one needed so much repair and was inadequate for their needs. A new building was erected, the old one being moved to form the west wing for use for Sunday School and social activities. It was dedicated September 21, 1902, debt free.

Extensive remodeling was done in 1931 while Rev. William Becker was pastor.

A new parsonage was erected in 1963 to replace the one built in 1906.

The church has grown through the years under the leadership of many fine pastors. Membership today is 241.

Public Invited To Centennial And Dedication Service

The coming week end will be a very memorable one for members of the United Church of Christ, Congregational, as well as for the Friend community itself. This church will observe its one hundredth birthday and a beautiful new edifice will be dedicated.

The public is cordially invited to attend any or all of these special services of the United Church of Christ, Congregational, Centennial Service, 8:30 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 20th, Morning Worship, 11 a.m. and Dedication Service, 2:30 p.m. Sunday, the 21st, by the pastor, Rev. Robert Peters.

In June, 1875 charter members, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Harrison, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Moeller, Mr. and Mrs. Anson Paine, and Henry Harrison, with Rev. B. G. Page as pastor, organized a Congregational church, with the membership growing to 29 within three years. The first church building was completed in 1878. This building was used as a Sunday school and social activities west wing of another new edifice which was dedicated September 21, 1902, debt free. Extensive remodeling took place in 1931, additional projects over the years enhanced the corner property, and were climaxed by the beautiful new structure this

For several years, many members have felt the need of a new building and after much prayer and discussion it was decided to move forward and erect the new edifice which will be dedicated Sunday, September 21, 1975 at 2:30 p.m.

Under the dedicated leadership of Rev. Robert Peters during the past seven years, the church has continued to move forward and now with the new plant, it hopes to do greater work in service to the community, the state and the world.

"CROP" RECEIPTS INCREASE

At a meeting in Lincoln, January 8, Dick Staple, Nebraska CROP Director, reported a total of more than \$335,000 received in money and donated grain in 1975. This is \$50,000 more than last year. Participants in Hunger Walks contributed nearly \$100,000 of the total received.

Tom Hemphill, Church World Service representative in India, spoke to the group. He indicated that Nebraska wheat made up a large portion of the Church World Service wheat shipped to India this year. He gave special recognition to the work of the Rev. Bob Peters and the Friend community in locating wheat needed this summer. Bob and several young people from his church were in attendance at the meeting.

Tom responded to a number of questions he has heard regarding the situation in India. Rumors that rats are consuming large quantities of Church World Service grain before it can be distributed are untrue he said. However, rats are a serious problem for the Indian farmers without adequate grain storage. Tom indicated that Church World Service will continue to give attention to that situation.

The grain sent to India by Church World Service is used as pay in "Food for Work" projects, many of which involve well digging and other forms of water development. The workers receive the grain at 60% of its market value. This means they are also volunteering part of their time to the project.

Historic Window Is "Back Home"



One of the beautiful stained glass windows that was once part of the old Congregational Church is "back home". Recently this memorial window was officially dedicated and now stands, encased in a beautiful oak cabinet, along the south wall

of the new church.

When the old church was torn down to make way for the present structure this window, along with others, was sold at public auction. Dr. Clarence Zimmer offered the highest bid and kept the window from going to an out-of-town antique dealer.

Church Historian for OBITUARY MABEL A. ZIEG

Mabel A. Zieg, daughter of John and Hannah (Swanson) Barney, was born at their farm home four and a half miles southeast of Friend, Nebr., on October 21, 1892. She was baptized in infancy and confirmed into the Swedish Lutheran faith. As a Lutheran Church was not established in Friend, she united with the United Church of Christ, being a member 51 years.

She obtained her early education at Tabor School, Dist. No. 13, Saline County, and graduated from Friend High School with the class of 1911. For eight years she taught in rural schools and also the sixth

grade at Friend.

On June 11, 1924 she was united in marriage with Henry Zieg. They farmed northwest of Friend, in 1930 moving to their own farm three miles east and one mile north of Friend, and retired to 407 Cherry Street in 1954. They celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary in 1974.

She was a member of Womens Fellowship and charter member of the Sunshine Club.

She is survived by her husband Henry Zieg of Friend, three sisters, Mrs. Rena J. Huber, Mrs. Selma O. Mulnix, and Mrs. Pearl E. Benson, all of Friend; nieces, nephews and cousins.

Preceding her in death were her parents, four brothers and a sister.

After a short illness she passed away at the Warren Memorial Hospital on July 3, 1975 at the age of 82 years.

Services were at the United Methodist Church with Rev. Dale Westadt officiating. She was laid to rest in the Andrew Cemetery. Moore's Funeral Home was in charge.
